→ As luxury becomes increasingly down-to-earth, a new crop of English hotels are positioning themselves at the


trend's pioneering vanguard. On June 1, **Ham Yard Hotel** (www.firmdalehotels.com; from £310) will open in **LONDON**'s Soho — with a kitchen garden atop the roof. Here, home-grown tomatoes, blueberries and their ilk will be farmed to create a new feature on the capital's skyline. Built in a vacant lot off Great Windmill Street, this 90-room hotel from designer Kit Kemp will also have a restaurant, bar and drawing room, as well as an adjacent 176-seat cinema and four-lane 1950s-style bowling alley. For out-of-town chic, one needs to look towards **The Pig on the Beach**, opening also in June in sleepy **DORSET** (www.thepighotel.com;



→ If getting in touch with a more natural way of living is important for family holidays, then **Kid & Coe** (www.kidandcoe.com) gets it right, championing exceptional destinations like **Galápagos Safari Camp** on **SANTA CRUZ** (from \$3,580 for a five-day, six-night tour for a family

of six), where the owners' children – who also help play host to guests' children – are more at ease with giant tortoises than they are with the usual coterie of dogs. This new agency specialising in family vacations has style-sensitive tentacles reaching all over the world, providing clients with chic, uncluttered homes-for-rent in destinations ranging from **BALI** to **CAPE COD**.

→ For a child-free zone — and thus the perfect honeymoon — there's a stylish nautical option in **INDONESIA**: Alexa (www.alexaprivatecruises.com). This white-as-a-cloud wooden phinisi has recently been turned into a spectacular single-suite boat that cruises the waters around the Indonesian archipelago


(all-inclusive three-night charters from \$9,000). There's also

NEW YORK, where this month an unusual adults-only pop-up hotel opens during the Frieze Art Fair, which runs May 8-12 on Randall's Island Park (www. friezenewyork.com). Al's Grand Hotel (rooms from £350) will be located inside the main Frieze tent (which holds a Guinness World Record as the largest single-unit marquee), and is a reimagining of a pop-up created

by conceptual artist Allen Ruppersberg in 1971 – a Sunset Boulevard fixture for six months that hosted gatherings and provided an occasional bed for the night. For Frieze, Ruppersberg is working with LA-based artist group Public Fiction, creating two rooms and a lobby.

→ If staying in such a place feels like you're making an exhibition of yourself, then **Mwiba** (www.legendaryexpeditions.com; from \$2,100 per night) in **TANZANIA** is the very opposite – a brand-new, off-the-beaten-track safari camp of impressive luxury proportions

with no other lodge in close proximity. Set to take on the likes of the private reserve Singita Grumeti, this Americanowned project overlooks a rocky gorge on the Arugusinyai River, and is made up of eight double suites – stilted, so they touch the earth lightly and have a low impact on the land – which are layered in shades of cream, tan, chocolate and charcoal. Canvas "outdoor-in" bathrooms have soaking tubs that look towards transporting views of more than 50,000 acres of privately leased wildlife country. There's also a gym and pool, as well as in-room massage treatments. Booking can be made through Journeys by Design (www.journeysbydesign.com).



cruising around the Indonesian archipelago

→ For a multigenerational family holiday, ambitious African safaris are on a rising curve; on a kinder budget is the Italian alternative, taking a house on the Massimo Ferragamo-owned, 4,000-acre **Castiglion del Bosco** estate (www.castigliondelbosco.com; doubles from €450) in **TUSCANY**, where **La Canonica Cooking School** kicks off a new season focusing on



the Italian home-cook's "forgotten flavours" (two-hour classes from €200 per person). The appeal of this place is its emphasis on families and feasting under a Tuscan sun, which is also true of another new cooking venture: **Desinare** (www.desinare.it) in **FLORENCE**, which launched in March with classes (from €120 per person in a group of five or more), an event venue and a cookshop in the elegant Oltrarno premises of interior designer Riccardo Barthel. +

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
